9.00 AM - 9.35 AM: Channeling your inner salmon with Alistair Croll

About this session:

Salmon live in the sea, but must travel hundreds of miles upstream to spawn. They're incredible jumpers, leaping tirelessly out of the water to climb rapids in the face of incredible hardship.

Like a river, the way a law turns into services and enforcement also flows downhill. Often, thousands of pages of internally inconsistent policies are simply thrown down the waterfall to those who must build them. When that's impossible, the bravest public servants must find a way to get back upstream, letting their superiors know that what's been agreed to is impractical, expensive, or simply impossible.

Nobody wants to be the salmon. But those closest to the end user—citizen, resident, or denizen—are the most likely to encounter issues. Unless we find a way for those ideas to swim back upstream, vaulting rapids and jumping waterfalls, nothing's going to change.

About this session:

Digital technology is embedded into how our cities work. All around us, sensors are collecting data about the movement of people, objects and vehicles, and the environment. But how can people understand how that data is used to manage our shared spaces? Without transparency and legibility, it's hard to build public trust in the implementation of these technologies in our communities.

Communities across North America, Australia and France are taking steps to shift this paradigm through their use of Digital Trust for Places and Routines (DTPR), an open-source communication standard to increase transparency, legibility and accountability for digital technology in public places. By using DTPR to make the kind of data collection that's normally invisible more visible, these communities are creating new feedback pathways and building organizational capacity to deploy smart city technologies in a way that enables inclusion and participation so that trust can be fostered in their use.

This talk will provide the audience with some of the key successes and learnings from past and current implementations of DTPR, and an overview of what's planned to foster the growth of the open-source standard.

10.50 AM - 11.15 AM: Revolution, not evolution, for federal public service delivery with Sean Boots

About this session:

Efforts to transform how the Canadian government delivers digital services have stalled; public service morale is at the lowest point in years. Meanwhile, public and media recognition of the importance of "state capacity" (can the government actually deliver programs and services?) is growing. What needs to change to close this gap?

In this talk, Sean will present thoughts on macro- and micro-level changes that could improve how the public service works, and in turn, improve how effectively it delivers public services. Incrementalism hasn't worked; big changes are needed. Much like the UK more than a decade ago, the Canadian public service needs "revolution, not evolution" to become an organization able to deliver services that meet people's needs. How to do that, in turn, in a way that brings public servants along and empowers them, instead of sidelining them, is the challenge in turn.

This talk will build on Sean's experience as a public servant working on technology efforts over the past 7 years, his care for fellow public servants, and his "chaotic good" alignment as a public servant. Bring on the revolution!

Drawing from years in government and civic tech, she provides clear examples of heroism in the face of dysfunction, and a bold call for rethinking how governments can overcome the crisis. The Indigenous Centre for Cumulative Effects (ICCE) is facilitating discussions with the Athabasca Chipewyan First Nation, Chipewyan Prairie Dene First Nation, Fort McKay First Nation, Mikisew Cree First Nation, and the Open Science and Data Platform (OSDP) teams from Natural Resources Canada (NRCan) and Environment and Climate Change Canada (ECCC) to launch a pilot project that respectfully integrates Indigenous Knowledge (IK) and Indigenous owned data into the OSDP.

A panel discussion with pilot project participants will highlight the vital role of IK in comprehending industrial impacts on Indigenous communities, addressing responsible data sharing issues. This discussion will underscore the importance of honoring Indigenous

communities' rights and traditions while sharing knowledge appropriately (e.g., following OCAP principles) and integrating IK into decision-making. Valuable insights from pilot project co-leaders and a possible technical OSDP demonstration will be included. Mr. Sean Power, Executive Officer and Entrepreneur-In-Residence at ICCE, will moderate the panel.

The cohort had a significant impact, with staff learning about research, informing new programs, and making improvements to existing services based on user feedback.

Attendees will learn about the benefits of the cohort model for user research, including how it creates a community of practice and enables cities to share knowledge and resources. The talk is suitable for anyone interested in user research, particularly those interested in how user research can be used to improve public service delivery.

9.00 AM - 9.25 AM: Why Societies Fail, and What To Do About It with Alistair Croll

About this session:

As every society confronts issues stemming from growth (such as theft or taxation or defense) it creates new layers to deal with it (such as a judicial system, or revenue assessors, or armies) which further increase its costs—a pattern Joseph Tainter has tracked across several civilizations.

In Collapse of Complex Societies, Tainter says that societies collapse because of "diminishing returns on investments in social complexity." In other words, the more complex something gets, the harder order is to maintain. There's a solution, however: Modularization. A set of standardized, well-maintained components—each owned and improved by a discrete

group—can reverse Tainter's curse. Government built from shared infrastructure and re-usable components can scale, while reducing the complexity under whose weight they would otherwise be crushed.

Governments want to work on what matters, and have a positive impact on the communities they serve. But delivering on that promise is complex, and often challenging. And while emerging technologies offer tantalizing promise, sometimes it's hard to distinguish fiction from reality.

Generative AI is no exception. In the last year, algorithms that can converse, reason, speculate, understand voice and images, generate art, and solve problems have gone from science fiction to a tap on our phones and a click on our screens.

But you're right to have questions: How does it work? How can it be incorporated into service delivery? What are the ethical and legal risks for early adopters?

Examples of how powerful AI can be are everywhere. Consider, for example, how Avanade partnered with SSE Renewables to create a wildlife tracking and modeling tool atop Microsoft AI and Azure (video here) that ensured wind farms wouldn't impact Puffin habitats.

With decades of experience navigating waves of new technology, Avanade CTO Aaron Reich has the background to guide us through the uncharted waters of AI. In this open conversation with FWD50 chair Alistair Croll, he'll bring modern AI to life with concrete examples, sharing lessons learned from his work with some of the largest public- and private-sector organizations in the world.

Governments operate from a place of mistrust. By default, we treat everyone we serve as if they are trying to defraud us, until they prove to us that they are "safe" by performing certain behaviours. Guilty until proven innocent. We make them jump through complicated hoops to access services that should be available to everyone. We are gatekeepers of so many things: They can't get the money until they do the forms. They can't access the information until they prove their identity. They can't have the tax credit until they show the receipts.

What if we defaulted to trusting people? Maybe governments need to show trust to gain trust, because trust goes both ways. We can't treat everyone like a fraudster and then be surprised when people turn against us.

As a long-time user researcher and service designer, Martha has learned a lot about people's perceptions of government and has some ideas on how we can move the dial on trust. It's not going to be easy or comfortable - it involves shifting power, taking risks and asking hard questions - but it could change everything.
